Faith and Forgiveness

he depth of my mother's love for all of her children was boundless," Kabera tells me. "We had everything we needed in the Democratic Republic of Congo. We lived on a farm, had all the food we could eat, and if one of us children needed something, our parents would provide it. Our family prayed together daily and we attended church each week. We had a very good life."

Kabera was 12 years old when the rebels came during the night. They banged on the door of the house, shouting that the door must be opened. Kabera's mom quickly awakened the children, telling them that they must run when she opened the door. She

stood in the doorway while her children scattered in many directions out the back. Some of the rebels chased them. Although the bullets flew around them, they weren't hit. The rest of the killers grabbed their mom and interrogated her, asking her where her husband and children were. When she refused to answer. they killed her with machetes in the front yard of their home. "My beautiful mother sacrificed her life for us." Kabera, teary eyed, said. Their father had gone to do some business in a village nearby. that another group of rebels

Eventually the children learned had kidnapped and killed him. They were heartbroken when they heard the news. Their dad was dead; (Con't on page 2)

Kabera and his oldest brother, Justin, decided that it might be possible to continue to live in their country if they could find a peaceful area. They prayed for God to help them find such a place. The rebels eventually came each time they found a safe place to live but they never found them; their bullets and machetes never hurt them. After five years of moving around the DRC looking for safety and staying in hiding when they couldn't find it, the young family made the tough decision to leave their country and flee to safety in Rwanda. Led by their elder brother Justin, they began the long walk on narrow paths through the forests, eating a little fruit and vegetables they found along the way, and taking turns carrying their five-yearold brother on their backs. "It took us a week to reach the border," Kabera says, "and hunger walked with us every step of the way. Hunger hurts like a bad disease."

They were sad and confused when they reached the Nyabiheke refugee camp. Although they were Congolese, they could never return to their home. They had no family or friends to help them at the camp; they were alone. Finding small jobs to earn money for food was a challenge; making their home habitable was too. Nonetheless the family prayed together daily and thanked God for His love. Eventually Kabera and his younger siblings went to school, but they never had enough food and they were always hungry.

Then, Impact Hope came and Kabera was selected as a student. Kabera smiles as he says, "Impact Hope changed my life! I was able to go to a good school with teachers who cared about us. We had beds to sleep on, good food at each meal, textbooks, and we worshipped God together each day." After he graduated, Impact Hope sent him to a vocational training school where he learned tailoring. A sponsor helped him get the equipment he needed, and

currently Kabera has a tailoring business in the camp. It's the Congolese custom for the father to give each of his children a name. Kabera was given the name Ndagije. It means give to others and you will be blessed. He knows this is true and because of it he gives free tailoring instruction to refugee students who want to learn tailoring. If you have received a tote bag or an apron from Impact Hope, it's because Kabera Ndagije and his team have sewn them. "It's a blessing to help Impact Hope because they have given me such a bright future." Kabera says.

I asked Kabera if he'd forgiven the men who had killed his parents. "God loves all of us," he said. "My faith is strong because I know that God is powerful. I forgive them because Jesus forgives me in my daily life. Prayer is the key to everything. I pray for those men every day, hoping that they will understand how much God loves them and will repent from their hateful and murderous ways." Faith, forgiveness, and prayer form the basis of Kabera's life. He believes that the best way to honor God is to share his love with others. His love is shown in his actions as well as his words.
