Because of Your Sponsorship

My name is Theogene, and my family lives in the Kigeme refugee camp.

This is my story.

I remember many things before becoming a refugee in the Congo. I would walk one kilometer to and from school. After school, I was responsible for taking care of the family goats.

One evening as I was returning home with the goats, I heard the sound of gunfire and felt bullets whiz by my head as people were shooting at someone behind me. The goats were spooked and bolted home. I urgently ran to catch them.

When I neared my home, I saw four soldiers with my parents. They were asking for bribes from my parents and trying to recruit my father to their cause. My father responded that he could not join them, but he did pay the bribe money.

One of the soldiers saw me watching the event unfold. He told me to show him where the kitchen was. After showing him, I left the soldier to share our food with his comrades and ran off into the woods to hide. When the soldiers finished eating their food and left our house, I returned to be with my family.

After one week, my father came home saying we must move to Rwanda because the soldiers wanted to enlist my father and uncle. The following morning, we packed our family and got on a bus heading to the border. (continued inside)

(Continued from the first page) We traveled seven kilometers until soldiers stopped us at a checkpoint and forced everyone off the bus. The soldiers picked through the passengers, allowing only Hutus to continue to the border. We, along with the other passengers who were Tutsi, were sent back to our homes in the Congo.

The following day we attempted to go to the border again. This time without my father because he needed to stay to take care of the cattle. We rode on two different motorcycles. I was on a motorcycle with my two little sisters. My mother and brother

were on the other one.
A soldier stopped my
motorcycle while my mother
continued ahead. The soldier
said that I was too old to
continue and must go back
and take care of my little sisters
in the Congo. I pleaded with
him that I could not, at ten
years old, provide for my two
little sisters. We were kept at
the checkpoint for one hour
until the soldier finally let us go.

We met our mother and brother in the town of Sake, Congo. We kept moving until we made it to immigration at the border city of Goma. Rwandan immigration accepted our family as refugees into the country.

We were escorted to the Nkamira refugee camp and given two packages of maize flour, beans, salt, and oil per month to live on. We did not receive any clothes or money to get clothes. We were kept in a large warehouse building that housed over 120 families.

After one month, we moved to the Kigeme refugee camp. Since 2012, I have been living

in Kigeme camp. The first year, there was no school provided. The following year a school was built nearby, which allowed me to begin my studies again.

As I approached my tenthgrade year, I did not think I would be able to continue my studies because my school only went up to the ninth grade. When I learned that Impact Hope was sponsoring students who passed their national exams, I became determined. If I did not continue my studies, chances of finding a steady job would be slim.

I studied very hard and passed my national exam! In 2019, Impact Hope selected me to attend a Christian boarding school. Sponsorship allows me to learn educational knowledge and practical life skills. My education not only helps me but my family as well.

You took me when I had nothing. You gave me the chance to achieve my dreams and be something. I will be able to support myself and my family in the future because of your sponsorship.
