The Miracle that Changed Janvier

"I'm Jesus' child!" Janvier smiles as he tells his story. Orphaned a few days after his birth, he was raised by his grandmother who named him Nduwayezu. It means the child of Jesus in Kinyarwandan. They played, prayed, talked, and laughed together. He loved his grandmother very much. "The time of trouble came when the Mai Mai (community based militia in the Democratic Republic of the Congo) grew very violent in our area. Other groups were also at war and it was very dangerous for anyone they didn't like. Friends who lived on our farm told my grandma that they were too scared to stay and were leaving for Rwanda." His grandma knew that Janvier would be

targeted so she arranged for

him to go with them - she was 80, disabled, and had to stay. Although he was just 11, he knew that it was likely to be the last time they would see each other. They prayed together before he left and she gave him a goodbye hug. She died a few years later; Janvier thinks of her every day.

The transit camp was awful. There wasn't enough food, the sanitation was poor, and many people were very sick. The situation was so bad that the people he was with decided to return to DRC where life was better. Janvier was left alone. "I was lonely and afraid. Eventually I was moved to the Kigeme camp." Life in Kigeme was better but there still wasn't enough (continued inside)



food. "Although someone from Save the Children checked on me every day, I lived alone and I was very young. There was no one to say aood morning to me when I woke up and no one to smile at me when I

came back from school."

Attending school was a challenge - it was hard to Janvier says, "The student explained that the get the clothing and shoes he needed for school and it was difficult to concentrate because he was hungry. Eventually he moved into a house with older boys and they shared food together." go to school and they wanted me to act like they did. I continued to go to school and studied hard in spite of their influence. My scores were high on the national exams but it looked impossible for me and other students to go to high school. This was the first time that I learned that God has more than a thousand ways to take care of us. Impact Hope came and rescued us! We could go to a good school!" Janvier still needed a sponsor though. Thousands of miles away a young teenager looked at information from Impact Hope and decided that he wanted to be Janvier's sponsor. "It was another miracle!" Janvier says.

Janvier loved Gahogo Adventist Academy, the Christian boarding school he was sponsored to attend through Impact Hope. He wanted

to become a good man and wondered how he could change and be a better person. The students at Gahogo have prayer time after lunch and Janvier joined a group. It was there that one of the students told the story about Jesus

sleeping in the boat during a great storm when the disciples were so afraid and woke Him up. same Jesus who calmed the storm can help us. He will calm any storms that we experience. That story changed my life and gave me a new hope. I was baptized at Gahogo because I know The camps aren't good places. Those boys didn't that Jesus can touch our lives with miracles and will help us with everything. I want to share His love!" Janvier's goal is to study international law. "I lived in DRC - a country with no justice. People are put in prison without a trial. Their property is taken from them and they are often killed like animals." He wants to help people who have been treated unjustly and don't have money to hire a lawyer. Eventually he wants to start an organization that can aid them.

> Janvier's sponsor (who's assisted by a relative) wants to meet him in Rwanda someday. They plan to play basketball together when they meet. "God touches the hearts of the Impact Hope sponsors," Janvier says. And in America, the teenager who chose to sponsor Janvier feels exactly the same way.
